Motivation for my candidature; how I wish to serve and develop the committee and accomplish as a board member:

As head of the curatorial department of the MAS in Antwerp, Belgium, I am part of a museum which aims to connect local and global culture, with a collection of 500 000 objects which are affiliated with Antwerp, its city and port, with shipping and overseas trade and with Europe, Asia, Africa, America and Oceania.

The diversity of the MAS collection and the ambition of the MAS to act as a node in networks and not as an isolated knowledge center with this collection, implies that the MAS deals with many of the contemporary challenges with regard to collections, such as decolonization and restitution, collaboration with communities, contemporary collecting, polyphony in collecting and in registration of objects, significance assessment of collections, relations between material and intangible culture.

Hence, COMCOL is a very interesting network for the MAS and a network to which I want to contribute conceptually and practically. I believe COMCOL can be highly relevant with regard to human rights, peace and decolonization, since international colleagues can meet on an equal base in COMCOL. A priority for COMCOL is attracting new members and more diverse perspectives. Positioned in Belgium, I am involved in both English- and French-speaking networks. I will try to use this linguistic background to widen the COMCOL network.

### Motivation for my candidature; how I wish to serve and develop the committee and accomplish as a board member:

I have been a regular COMCOL member since 2011. As a board member I wish to use my experience of having worked as a curator of archaeology at the Mutare Museum in Zimbabwe to develop further knowledge on the practice, theory and ethics of collecting both tangible and intangible collections in museums. I am interested in current debates and discussions around the decolonisation of museum collection from an African persepective. My current research looks at how national museums in Africa continue to reproduce colonial forms of knowledge and of being and at what it means to decolonise the museum practice. Henceforth as a board member of COMCOL one of my main priority would be in advancing the need to connect collections with their points of origins by embracing biographical approaches. This is so because for example from an African context, objects have potency and are treated by indigenous people as living beings which they can touch, smell and taste. These objects constitute a part of an interconnected whole and although these objects may appear mundane within ethnographic classifications, they have individual biographies and carry with them important meanings connected to their ritual and cultural functions located in societies of origin. I was recently appointed curator of living cultures at the University of Manchester Museum and I have a task of connecting living collections with diaspora and or source communities by collaborative engagements.

#### Background/short bio/CV, special competences and interests beneficial for COMCOL and ICOM:

I have a Ph.D. in Anthropology from the University of the Witwatersrand, Johannesburg, South Africa. I am currently working at the University of Manchester Museum as a curator of living Cultures and is responsible for the care of more than 20,000 objects from Africa, Asia, Oceania and the Americas, as well as building new research and forming relationships and collaborations. I was previously employed by the National Museums and Monuments of Zimbabwe (NMMZ) as a curator in the archaeology department for ten years. I am interested in looking at the empirical ways by which the museum practice in Africa can be decolonised through epistemic and aesthetic disobedience by undoing earlier ways of knowledge production in collection practices and exhibitions. Thus, I have carried out research that looks at how national museums in Africa continue to reproduce colonial forms of knowledge and of being and at what it means to decolonise the museum practice. I have extensively published research papers that looks at ongoing debates around the coloniality of museums and associated knowledge production and representation practices, to imagine a decolonised museum in Africa. Some of my articles are included in journals such as Curator; The Museum Journal, Journal of Southern African Studies, Development Southern Africa Journal of Community Archaeology and Heritage, Museum International, Museum Management and Curatorship and International Journal of Intangible Heritage. He has also contributed articles in books such as Museums Activism, Robert Janes and Richard Sandell (eds), London: Routledge, pp. 164-173, and Research Handbook on Contemporary Intangible Cultural Heritage Law and Heritage, Charlotte Waelde et.al (eds), Cheltenham: Edward Elgar Publishing, pp.379-398. My first book entitled Museums as Agents for Social Change: Collaborative Programmes at the Mutare Museum was published by Routledge in April 2021.

Transformative positive change is a collective endeavor, one that I believe COMCOL is supporting and that I would contribute towards as a Board Member.

Brandie Macdonald's is a citizen of the Chickasaw Nation with Choctaw ancestry. Brandie's work focuses on systemic change in museums through the implementation of decolonial theory-inpractice, which centers truth-telling, accountability, and actionable change. She is the Senior Director of Decolonizing Initiatives at the Museum of Us. She is also an active freelance consultant working to support non-profits, museums, education, and Indigenous communities internationally. Her 14 years working in non-profits is based around capacity building through policy, repatriation, and education. She has worked in areas of economic capacity building with Indigenous communities domestically (rural/urban), with intergenerational healing through culture-driven curricula, and in gender and racial equity initiatives in the bicycle industry. Brandie is enrolled in a Ph.D. program for Education Studies at University of California, San Diego. Her research, which aligns with her work as a practitioner, focuses on the sustainable application of decolonizing praxis in museums that enables structural change and cross-cultural movement building. She also holds a M.Ed. in International Education and a B.A in Applied Anthropology. Brandie's a Salzburg Global Seminar Fellow, American Alliance of Museums' Nancy Hanks Award for Professional Excellence recipient, Smithsonian Affiliate Fellow, and is on the Western Museums Association Board.

Since 2013 she has been with DOMiD e.V., the Documentation Center and Museum of Migration in Germany. Her work involved collecting and working with the collections, conducting interviews, education and outreach, but also co-curating exhibitions, both physical and virtual (www.virtuelles-migrationsmuseum.org). Parallel to this, she organized participatory, object-based workshops on migration history for trade union members as a freelancer. Currently she manages the participatory project "DOMiDLabs: Making Museum Design Participatory" which aims at developing design ideas and testing participatory methods for DOMiD's upcoming Migration Museum in Cologne. The project involves members of the civil society as well as international experts and scenographers.

Since the end of 2021 she has been an affiliated board member of COMCOL. Furthermore, she is active within COMCOL Germany, a working group for the German-speaking museum world.
